#### **EUROPEAN UNION**

#### 10 initiatives - European Year of Cultural Heritage

It is halfway through the <u>European Year of Cultural Heritage</u> and it can already be said that the Year is very successful, with thousands of dedicated events and initiatives all across Europe. On a European level, the European Commission is running a series of projects around 10 central themes to make sure that the Year will have a long-term impact. These so-called <u>10 European initiatives</u> are related to the four principles that guide the Year: Engagement, Sustainability, Protection and Innovation. Many of the projects are run in cooperation with partners such as UNESCO, the Council of Europe and heritage networks. It involves both new projects and the strengthening of existing projects. The actions vary from <u>quality principles for cultural heritage interventions in EU projects</u> and <u>policy recommendations on sustainable cultural tourism</u> to a <u>cultural heritage toolkit for schools</u> and a <u>set of interactive maps on Europe's cultural heritage</u>. Besides the 10 initiatives, the Commission also recently selected <u>29 EYCH cooperation projects</u>, which will receive funding under the Creative Europe programme.

#### European Commission proposes a new European Agenda for Culture

On 22 May 2018, the Commission presented a new package of initiatives in the fields of youth, education and culture. The proposed initiatives respond to the call from EU leaders in late 2017 (see European affairs update - Jan 2018) to give these policy fields a stronger role in the EU, as these domains can help to build a more competitive, inclusive and cohesive Europe. One of the elements of this package is a proposal for a new European Agenda for Culture (COM(2018)267 final). The Agenda will provide the framework for future European cooperation in the field of culture. Responding to the current societal challenges, the Agenda focuses on the potential of culture for social cohesion and well-being, the economic dimension of culture, and international cultural relations. The Agenda also identifies two cross-cutting areas of policy actions: cultural heritage and digital4culture. In the field of cultural heritage, the Agenda mentions that an Action Plan for Cultural Heritage will be presented at the end of this year to give a follow-up to the 10 European initiatives. The Commission will also prepare an Action Plan on illicit trade in cultural goods to support the enforcement of the future EU Regulation on the import of cultural goods. The Agenda will be implemented in strong collaboration with the member States (through Council Work Plans for Culture), European Parliament, civil society and international partners. Besides the proposal itself, the Commission also published a factsheet and a staff working document with more detailed information about the proposed actions.

Council Conclusions on the need to bring cultural heritage to the fore across EU policies
The Council of the EU recently adopted Conclusions on the need to bring cultural heritage to the fore
across policies in the EU. Member States and the Commission are invited to take cultural heritage into
account in relevant EU policies and programmes and to raise awareness of the financing opportunities
for cultural heritage. The Ministers of Culture also make several other recommendations, for instance
to further enhance the principle of participatory governance of cultural heritage and to deepen and

### Committee of the Regions adopts opinions on culture and cultural heritage as a strategic resource for Europe

The European Committee of the Regions (CoR) adopted two opinions in relation to culture and cultural heritage at its plenary session on 17 May 2018: Strengthening European identity through education and culture and Cultural heritage as a strategic resource for more cohesive and sustainable regions in the EU. Both documents follow on an earlier debate, organised by the SEDEC Commission of the CoR. The CoR will continue its work on this topic under the Knowledge Exchange Platform (KEP), a form of cooperation between the CoR and the European Commission's DG for Research and Innovation. Cultural heritage is one of the four main areas of cooperation for the KEP in 2018 in 2019. Several events will be organised in the next two years, among which a seminar during the European Week of Regions and Cities on the topic 'Cultural heritage, a living resource for innovating European cities and regions'. #### European Parliament report on barriers to accessing culture

On 14 June 2018, the European Parliament adopted a <u>report on structural and financial barriers in the access to culture</u>. The report, prepared by the <u>CULT Committee</u>, stresses the importance of an active and accessible cultural sector for the development of an inclusive society and the strengthening of a common core of universal values and active European citizenship. It analyses four types of barriers (financial, educational, structural and technological) and encourages the Commission and member States to take action. #### **COUNCIL OF EUROPE**

#### Cooperation project on the promotion of the Faro Convention

The Council of Europe and the European Commission have launched a new joint project called 'The Faro Way' to promote the principles of the Faro Convention, the Council of Europe's Framework Convention on the value of cultural heritage for society. The project is part of one of the 10 European initiatives of the EYCH 2018. It aims to encourage the role of civil society and communities in heritage governance and to increase the number signatories and ratifications of the Faro Convention. The project will comprise several seminars, publications, audio-visual materials and networking opportunities.

### Resolution and Recommendation on the deliberate destruction and illegal trafficking of cultural heritage

The Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (PACE) has adopted a Resolution and a Recommendation on the deliberate destruction and illegal trafficking of cultural heritage. The PACE welcomes the new Council of Europe Convention on Offences relating to Cultural Property (CETS No. 221) and urges its wide ratification and implementation. Based on a report by PACE Member Stefan Schennach (Committee on Culture, Science, Education and Media), the PACE provides several recommendations to the Committee of Ministers and the member States of the Council of Europe. The PACE recommends, among others, that states set up a central national authority and engage in international cooperation between source, transit and final destination countries, in order to share information, harmonise laws and standardise procedures.

### Funding and investments

#### PROPOSALS FOR THE POST-2020 BUDGETS AND PROGRAMMES

The European Commission has presented its package of proposals for the <u>new long-term EU budget</u>, the Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF). Over the next months, the Council and European Parliament will discuss the proposals. The three institutions hope to reach an agreement before the European elections in May 2019.

#### Proposal for the next research and innovation framework programme

Horizon Europe will be the successor of Horizon 2020. The programme will aim to strengthen the EU's scientific and technological base in order to help tackle the major global challenges of our time. It also intends to foster the EU's competitiveness and its innovation performance and it will help to deliver on the Union's strategic priorities (such as the Paris Agreement on climate change). The proposed budget for research and innovation is €114.8 billion for 2021-2027, of which €97.6 billion is allocated to Horizon Europe. The new programme will be implemented through three pillars: Open Science, Global Challenges and Industrial Competitiveness, and Open Innovation. The programme will have several new features, such as <u>EU-wide research and innovation missions</u> and a European Innovation Council. It will also embrace Open Science. This means that it will go beyond the open access policy of Horizon 2020 and require open access to publications, data, and to research data management plans. Cultural heritage is mentioned as one of the topics within the cluster Inclusive and Secure Society, under the pillar Global Challenges and Industrial Competitiveness (see p.26 of Annexes to Proposal for a Decision COM(2018)436).

#### **Proposal for the next Creative Europe programme**

Creative Europe will continue to exist as a separate programme for European culture and media. The new proposal builds on the existing structure of the programme, with Culture, Media and a reinforced cross-sectoral strand. For the 2021-2027 period, the Commission proposes to increase the budget for Creative Europe from epsilon1.46 billion to epsilon1.85 billion, of which epsilon609 million will be allocated to the Culture sub-programme. The main aim of the new programme will be to promote European cooperation on cultural and linguistic diversity and heritage, as well as increase the competitiveness of the cultural and creative sectors. The Commission recognises the crucial role of the cultural and creative sectors in driving economic and social development, and in helping build strong international relations. The new programme will provide more opportunities for cross-border projects and it will pay more attention to digital challenges and opportunities.

The Guarantee Facility of the European Commission and the European Investment Fund (EIF) is part of the Creative Europe programme and supports SMEs in cultural and creative sectors. ### **EUROPE FOR CITIZENS**

The Europe for Citizens programme aims to strengthen remembrance and to enhance civic participation at EU level. Under the strand 'European remembrance' the programme promotes debate, reflection and cooperation in the field of European integration and remembrance. The 'Democratic engagement and civic participation' strand supports projects aimed at enhancing democratic participation, solidarity and involvement at EU level. These are the priorities for 2018-2020. Currently, two calls for proposals are open under the second strand: 'Town twinning' and 'Network of towns' (deadline: 3 September 2018). #### **ERASMUS+**

Erasmus+ is the EU's programme to support education, training, youth and sport in Europe. The 2018 <u>call for proposals</u> supports several kinds of actions in education and training such as sector skills alliances and strategic partnerships. #### JPI ON CULTURAL HERITAGE AND GLOBAL CHANGE

The Joint Programming Initiative on Cultural Heritage and Global Change (JPI CH) supports the alignment of cultural heritage research in Europe in order to avoid fragmentation and to maximize the efficiency and added-value of national investments. In 2016 the JPI CH launched a new 4-year (Horizon 2020) project which will support further alignment and joint activities. During this 4-year phase JPI CH will launch four complementary calls, each with a specific thematic focus. Two calls were completed in 2017. The results of the call on Heritage in Changing Environments will be announced soon. A third call on identity and perception will probably open later this year. The JPI CH and the Cultural Heritage Agency of the Netherlands will organise an international conference on the best practices of participatory governance of built heritage on 4 October 2018 in Amersfoort, the Netherlands.

#### **HORIZON 2020**

Horizon 2020 is the EU's main funding programme for research and innovation in Europe. It is a financial instrument implementing the Innovation Union, a Europe 2020 flagship initiative aimed at securing Europe's global competitiveness. The business and academic world are also challenged to come up with solutions and ideas to tackle societal issues that arise across Europe.

The Horizon 2020 programme is built around three pillars: Excellent Science, Industrial Leadership and Societal Challenges and some horizontal actions. Depending on your work area or research interest opportunities might be found under all pillars. ### **EUROPEAN TERRITORICAL COOPERATION (INTERREG V)**

<u>Interreg V 2014-2020 (European Territorial Cooperation)</u> is a framework for the implementation of joint actions and policy exchanges in Europe between national, regional and local actors from different member States. The framework is part of the Cohesion Policy and promotes innovation, a better environment and harmonious economic, social and territorial development of the Union as a whole. Interreg is built around three strands of cooperation: cross-border (Interreg A, 60 cooperation programmes), transnational (Interreg B, 15 cooperation programmes) and interregional (Interreg C, 4 cooperation programmes.). There are <u>11 thematic objectives</u> which guide the ERDF investments 2014-2020 of which Interreg is part. Conserving, protecting, promoting and developing natural and cultural heritage is one of the <u>investment priorities</u> (priority 6c).

#### **Interreg Europe (former IVC)**

<u>Interreg Europe</u> helps regional and local governments across Europe to develop and deliver better policy. The programme facilitates exchange platforms and co-finances projects in which regional and local authorities (and other partners) can exchange good examples and ideas on public policy to improve the strategies for their citizens and communities. Specific objective 4.1 (see page 21-23 of <u>Programme Manual</u>) includes support to cultural heritage. The <u>fourth call for project proposals</u> closed on 22 June 2018. A Monitoring Committee will take a decision on the approval of applicants in March 2019.

#### **URBACT**

<u>URBACT</u> supports networks for cities to facilitate the exchange of good practices in the design and implementation of sustainable integrated urban policies. The programme supports three types of networks. Cultural heritage is one of the urban topics under URBACT. #### 19 new inscriptions UNESCO World Heritage list

The World Heritage Committee added 19 new sites to the UNESCO World Heritage list during its 42<sup>nd</sup> session, which was held from 24 June to 4 July 2018 in Manama, Bahrein. The new inscriptions comprise 13 culture sites, three natural sites and three mixed sites. The Committee also approved the extension of one natural site. #### **European Heritage Awards winners announced**

The European Commission and Europa Nostra have <u>announced the Award winners</u> of the 2018 <u>EU Prize for Cultural Heritage/Europa Nostra Awards</u>. The 27 Award winners have been recognised for their impressive accomplishments in conservation, research, dedicated service, and education, training and awareness-raising. Seven of the winners were selected as <u>Grand Prix laureates</u> during the Awards Ceremony at the European Cultural Heritage Summit in Berlin. The Public Choice Award went to the rehabilitation of the <u>Botanical Garden of the National Palace of Queluz</u>, Sintra, Portugal. The call for applications for the 2019 EU Prize for Cultural Heritage/Europa Nostra Awards will be launched in the autumn.

#### Berlin Call to Action 'Cultural heritage for the future of Europe'

The Berlin Call to Action was presented at the European Cultural Heritage Summit in Berlin by Europa Nostra, the German Cultural Heritage Committee (DNK) and the Prussian Cultural Heritage Foundation (SPK), which were the three co-hosting organisations of the Summit. It is a call to all concerned to build on the current momentum for cultural heritage and put cultural heritage at the heart of Europe's policies and priorities. The Berlin Call to Action describes seven actions that should help to unfold the potential of our shared heritage to advance to a more peaceful, prosperous, inclusive and just Europe. One of the suggested actions is the development of an ambitious European Action Plan for Cultural Heritage, an initiative that was already announced in the <a href="new European Agenda for Culture">new European Agenda for Culture</a>. The three organisations also call for more consolidation and improved synergy between different levels of governance and the various public and private stakeholders. In this context, they express the need for a more permanent platform for gathering knowledge, capacity building and coordinating advocacy for cultural heritage in Europe. All those who care for Europe's past, present and future are invited to sign and support the Berlin Call to Action.

#### Declaration of Funchal on 'Museums, Social Landmarks'

ICOM Europe and the World Federation of Friends of Museums have published a joint declaration in support of museums. It was signed at the occasion of the International Museums Day and has been named the <u>Declaration of Funchal on 'Museums, Social Landmarks'</u>. With this declaration, the organisations want to mark and celebrate the EYCH and boost the support for and development of museums in Europe. The Declaration of Funchal recalls the centrality of museums in the contemporary world and the great attachment of citizens to them. After years of budget cuts and in a time of economic recovery, the two organisations now call for improved financial support for museums, allowing them to better deliver their services to the community. The declaration also encourages museums to promote community involvement, to launch programs especially geared towards young adults and to strengthen their roles as catalysts for local economic development.

#### Time Machine FET Flagship proposal

The Time Machine project has announced that it has passed the first stage of evaluation of the Horizon 2020 call for new <a href="FET Flagships">FET Flagships</a>. It is one of the 16 projects still in the running for the second round. These Flagships are visionary, science-driven, large-scale research initiatives addressing grand scientific and technological challenges. If a project is selected, it will run for 10 years, mobilising hundreds of researchers across Europe, with an overall support of around 1 billion euros. The Time Machine project consortium currently has 187 partners in 32 countries. It is a very ambitious project that is structured around the development of a large-scale digitisation and computing infrastructure mapping millennia of European historical and geographical evolution, transforming kilometres of archives, large collections from museums and other geo-historical datasets into a distributed digital information system. The project will develop a unique 4D IT technology enabling navigation through time as easily as we navigate through space. You can read more about the Time Machine project in this press release.
