EUROPEAN UNION

2019 European Parliament elections

European elections were held in all EU member states in the period 23rd - 26th May 2019. The Ninth European Parliament had its first plenary session on 2 July 2019.

The European People's Party (Christian Democrats) won the most seats in the European Parliament, followed by S&D - Group of the Progressive Alliance of Socialists and Democrats in the European Parliament, and Renew Europe group in third place. MEPs elected David Sassoli as President of the European Parliament on 3 July. As an Italian MEP since 2009, he was re-elected on a Partito Democratico list in Central Italy in May 2019 for a third term. He will lead Parliament until January 2022. The MEPs elected Ursula von der Leyen as president of the European Commission on 16 July 2019 – she is the first woman to hold the post. Von der Leyen will put a team together based on nominees from national capitals (commissioners-designate), whose competence and abilities MEPs will examine in a series of parliamentary committee hearings in late September/October. Once this is done, MEPs will vote on the full College of Commissioners at the end of October.

EU budget 2020: Commission focuses its proposal on jobs, growth and security

The Commission has proposed an EU budget of €168.3 billion for 2020 for a more competitive European economy, and for solidarity and security in the EU and beyond. This budget is the seventh and last one under the current 2014-2020 long-term EU budget and operates within the limitations set therein. It is designed to optimise funding for existing programmes as well as new initiatives and to boost the European added value in line with the Juncker Commission's priorities. As per the Commission proposal, the money under the 2020 budget will go to the following priority areas: competitive economy and young people; and strengthening security and solidarity in the EU, climate change and beyond. 21% of the overall proposed budget for 2020 will go to tackle climate change. This aligns with the ambitious target of spending 20% of EU's current long-term budget on activities that address climate change. For more information, please follow [this link](#).

Sabine Verheyen elected Chair of the Committee on Culture and Education

Sabine Verheyen (EPP, DE) was elected by acclamation as the Chair of the Committee on Culture and Education at its [constituent meeting on 10 July](#). CULT also elected its 1st Vice-Chair, Romeo Franz (Greens/EFA), and 2nd Vice-Chair, Dace Melbārde (ECR, LV), by acclamation. The 3rd Vice-Chair, Julie Ward (S&D, UK), was elected by secret ballot on 22 July. The fourth Vice-Chair will be elected at a future meeting. Together, the Chair and Vice-Chairs make up the Bureau of the Committee, elected for a two-and-a-half year term.

European Council includes cultural heritage among EU's priorities for 2019-2024

At the [European Council meeting](#) on 20 June, EU Leaders adopted a new strategic agenda for the EU, setting out the policy priorities for the coming five years, and – for the first time – included investing in culture and cultural heritage among the EU's overall priorities.

The document adopted by the European Council – entitled '[A New Strategic Agenda 2019-2024](#)' – presents four main priorities and how to deliver on them: 1. Protecting citizens and freedoms, 2. Developing a strong and vibrant economic base, 3. Building a climate-neutral, green, fair and social Europe, 4. Promoting European interests and values on the global stage.

Cultural heritage is explicitly mentioned in the chapter on "Building a climate-neutral, green, fair and social Europe" - this is a major step up from the [Strategic Agenda](#) adopted five years ago. Read more about this [here](#).

EU Ministers commit to create a European network of cultural heritage expertise.

The Council of the EU was informed by the Presidency on the outcome of the meeting of the culture and European affairs ministers that took place in Paris on 3 May 2019, following the fire at Notre-Dame de Paris cathedral, which resulted in a great loss for all Europeans. At this meeting, co-chaired by France and the Romanian Presidency, ministers expressed their commitment to create a European network of expertise for cultural heritage, aimed at providing advice and support upon request when a Member State is in need. The new DSM Directive becomes law

The new Copyright in the Digital Single Market Directive ('DSM Directive' [analysed here](#)) was published in the EU [Official Journal of 17 May 2019](#) and came into force on 7 June 2019. EU/EEA Member States must transpose it into their national laws by 7 June 2021.

EU Commission proposes €9.2 billion investment in first ever digital programme

The European Commission is proposing to create the first ever [Digital Europe programme](#) and invest €9.2 billion to align the next long-term EU budget 2021-2027 with increasing digital challenges. The [Digital Single Market strategy](#) needs to be matched with equally ambitious funding and investments in the Digital Europe programme for increasing EU's international competitiveness as well as developing and reinforcing Europe's strategic digital capacities. These key capacities concern high-performance computing, artificial intelligence, cybersecurity and advanced digital skills and ensuring their wide use and accessibility across the economy and society by businesses and the public sector alike. EU Council adopts conclusions on young creative generations

On the 23rd of May, the Culture and Sports Council in Brussels adopted the Council conclusions on young creative generations. The decision comes under the umbrella of the [New European Agenda for Culture published in 2018](#), which focuses on supporting culture-based creativity in education and innovation. The conclusions highlight insecurity, the lack of social protection and precarious working conditions as the main problems which young people are facing in the current and future labour environment. The development of artistic and creative skills and the fostering of talent lie at the heart of the cultural and creative sectors and can act as a driver behind innovation and entrepreneurship. The Council Conclusions are in line with the [new Work Plan for Culture 2019-2022](#), the guiding principles of which recognise that culture contributes largely to sustainable social and economic development.

Council of Europe presents “Golden Collection” of good practices related to the Strategy 21

On the occasion of the launch of the “Golden Collection” of good practices related to the [European Heritage Strategy for the 21st Century](#) (“Strategy 21”), the French Chairmanship of the Council of Ministers hosted a roundtable debate in Strasbourg on 13 June to discuss the leading role of the Council of Europe (CoE) in heritage matters and best practices in heritage management with the participation of Europa Nostra. The special publication contains around 30 best practices that illustrate recommendations of the Strategy 21 and was prepared by the Council of Europe in partnership with the French Ministry of Culture. The Strategy 21 identifies [3 sets of challenges](#) – societal, development and knowledge challenges – and invites policy-makers, stakeholders and citizens to address these by following the concrete recommendations (see [factsheet](#)). For each of these recommendations, a best-practice example from among the laureates of the [European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards](#) features upon the initiative of Europa Nostra in the complete list of more than 100 inspiring [good practices](#) which is available online. 8th annual plenary session of the Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP)

The Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP) hold its 8th Plenary meeting in Strasbourg from 12 to 14 June 2019, in the Palais de l'Europe. Participants from among the fifty States signatory to the European Cultural Convention discussed the three main areas of the CDCPP's work and their contribution to democracy. A thematic session was held on climate change and sustainable development as related to human rights and democracy, and specifically, in the context of culture/heritage/landscape resources. The Committee also heard progress reports on ongoing activities and discussed possible new initiatives. More about the meeting [here](#).

Second Regional Seminar of the European Commission/Council of Europe joint programme “The Faro Way”

As follow up of the 2018 European Year of Cultural Heritage and in co-operation with the Cultural Heritage Agency of the Netherlands, a second seminar of the joint project “*The Faro Way: enhanced participation in cultural heritage*” was organised in Maastricht and Heerlen on 16-17 May 2019 with representatives from seven countries, Dutch cultural heritage stakeholders and international experts. Through presentations, discussions on selected topics and field visits to heritage-driven initiatives, the seminar provided an opportunity to explain in detail the Faro Convention approach to cultural heritage and to exchange on the actions that stakeholders, and particularly authorities, may have in supporting the Convention signature, ratification and implementation. The potential of cultural heritage to regenerate communities was also discussed through the experience of Heerlen, a city in a former mining region. More about the seminar [here](#).

Multiannual Financial framework (MFF)

Finland's presidency is fully committed to meeting the timetable set out by the EU leaders and to facilitating the final stages of the MFF negotiations. In its June 2019 conclusions, the European Council called on the presidency to develop the MFF's Negotiating Box. On that basis, EU leaders will hold an exchange of views in October, aiming for an agreement before the end of the year.

EU Commission to invest €11 billion in new solutions for societal challenges and drive innovation-led sustainable growth

The European Commission announced how it will spend the last and biggest annual tranche - €11 billion - of the EU research and innovation funding programme *Horizon 2020* in the final year of the programme. *Horizon 2020*, the EU's €77 billion research and innovation funding programme for the period 2014-2020, supports scientific excellence in Europe and has contributed to high-profile scientific breakthroughs.

Over the next year, the Commission will seek greater impact of its research funding by focusing on fewer, but crucial, topics such as climate change, clean energy, plastics, cybersecurity and the digital economy. It will also be geared towards shaping the future research and innovation landscape by preparing the way for [Horizon Europe](#), the next framework programme (2021-2027). An important novelty under Horizon Europe will be the *European Innovation Council* – a one-stop-shop for innovation funding to turn science into new business and accelerate the scale-up of companies. The European Innovation Council is [already running in its pilot phase](#) and will in 2020 benefit from a budget of €1.2 billion. Read more about this [here](#).

JPI ON CULTURAL HERITAGE AND GLOBAL CHANGE

The [Joint Programming Initiative on Cultural Heritage and Global Change \(JPI CH\)](#) supports the alignment of cultural heritage research in Europe in order to avoid fragmentation and to maximize the efficiency and added-value of national investments. In 2016 the JPI CH launched [a new 4-year \(Horizon 2020\) project](#) which will support further alignment and joint activities. During this 4-year phase JPI CH will launch four complementary calls, each with a specific thematic focus. Two calls were completed in 2017.

Conservation, protection and use Joint Call

The Conservation, Protection and Use call will support research into strategies, methodologies and tools to safeguard and use the physical components of our cultural heritage. It invites research projects that take a global approach to preserving Europe's heritage and which result in a better understanding of our history, traditions and culture, of our individual and collective identities, and ultimately of our well-being.

Each project consortium must comprise at least three research teams, each from a different country participating in the JPI CH Conservation, Protection and Use Call and based in an eligible institution. The maximum number of research teams in a project is five.

Only beneficiaries located in the countries participating in the JPI CH Conservation, Protection and Use Call and eligible for the funding organization specified are eligible to apply, irrespective of their nationality.

The countries participating in this call are: Belarus, Cyprus, Czech Republic, France, Italy, Latvia, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Spain, The Netherlands, The United Kingdom.

The call will include four main topics:

- Topic one: Analysing and modelling change
- Topic two: Sustainable protection and enhancement of values

- Topic three: Management of cultural heritage at risk
- Topic four: Layered conservation

HORIZON 2020

Horizon 2020 is the EU's main funding programme for research and innovation in Europe. It is a financial instrument implementing the Innovation Union, a Europe 2020 flagship initiative aimed at securing Europe's global competitiveness. The business and academic world are also challenged to come up with solutions and ideas to tackle societal issues that arise across Europe.

The Horizon 2020 programme is built around three pillars: Excellent Science, Industrial Leadership and Societal Challenges and some horizontal actions. Depending on your work area or research interest opportunities might be found under all pillars. Work Programmes 2018-2020

The European Commission has published its proposal for Horizon Europe, an ambitious €100 billion research and innovation programme that will succeed Horizon 2020.

The proposal was made as part of the EU's proposal for the next [EU long-term budget](#), the multiannual financial framework (MFF). Various building blocks were taken into account including the interim evaluation of Horizon 2020, the Lab-Fab-App report (informally the Lamy report), foresight studies and various other reports.

Consultation on Horizon Europe

The European Commission is preparing the [implementation of Horizon Europe](#), the next ambitious EU research and innovation programme (2021-2027) with a proposed budget of €100 billion, in an intensive co-design process. The process will help shape European research and innovation investments in the coming years. As part of the process, the Commission has launched an [online consultation](#) on 28 June 2019. The consultation will collect input from across Europe and beyond. The inputs received will help to prepare a 'Strategic Plan' for Horizon Europe, which will then guide the work programmes and calls for proposals for Horizon Europe's first four years (2021-2024). The Commission invites anyone with an interest in future EU research and innovation priorities, anywhere in the world, to participate in the consultation, which will close on 8 September 2019.

UK participation in H2020

After the UK government expressed its commitment to ensure that UK and EU researchers, universities and businesses will continue to be able to cooperate after Brexit (see the [UK government overview on the UK participation in H2020](#), which was published in December 2018), there were some concerns that a No-deal Brexit would cut UK's Horizon 2020 funding by almost half. A [report by the UK's House of Lords](#), issued in February 2019 demonstrated the peers reserves that replicating EU research programmes in the UK if the country leaves the EU without a deal would be 'a formidable challenge'. However, regardless of the Brexit outcome, the government has [guaranteed to underwrite all live and successful Horizon 2020 awards submitted before exit](#) and to fund projects for their duration. The government also guarantees a [post-EU extension underwrite to fund successful UK participants under H2020 schemes open to third country participants](#) submitted after exit until end of 2020.

EUROPEAN TERRITORIAL COOPERATION (INTERREG V)

[Interreg V 2014-2020 \(European Territorial Cooperation\)](#) is a framework for the implementation of joint actions and policy exchanges in Europe between national, regional and local actors from different member States. The framework is part of the Cohesion Policy and promotes innovation, a better environment and harmonious economic, social and territorial development of the Union as a whole. Interreg is built around three strands of cooperation: cross-border (Interreg A, 60 cooperation programmes), transnational (Interreg B, 15 cooperation programmes) and interregional (Interreg C, 4 cooperation programmes.). There are [11 thematic objectives](#) which guide the ERDF investments 2014-2020 of which Interreg is part. Conserving, protecting, promoting and developing natural and cultural heritage is one of the [investment priorities](#) (priority 6c).

Interreg Europe (former IVC)

[Interreg Europe](#) helps regional and local governments across Europe to develop and deliver better policy. The programme facilitates exchange platforms and co-finances projects in which regional and local authorities (and other partners) can exchange good examples and ideas on public policy to improve the strategies for their citizens and communities. Specific objective 4.1 (see page 21-23 of [Programme Manual](#)) includes support to cultural heritage. Interreg Europe monitoring committee has conditionally approved 74 projects out of 170 applications received in the fourth call for project proposals. Ten ideas for European Houses of Culture selected by EUNIC

In April, European Union National Institutes for Culture (EUNIC) members, EU delegations and their local cultural partners in third countries [were invited](#) to take part in a call for ideas for collaborations in cultural relations. The aim was to highlight promising cultural initiatives focusing on people-to-people approaches, co-creation and showcasing of cultural diversity. The 44 applications covered 51 countries in total from El Salvador to Benin to Vietnam.

The selected projects cover a range of cultural activities from theatre, festivals and technology all with the aim of fostering cultural exchanges and increasing cultural and artistic engagement of the public. First 17 “European Universities” selected: a major step towards building a European Education Area

The European Commission has announced in June the higher education institutions from all over Europe that will be part of the first “European Universities” alliances. Culture in and for sustainable development – Finnish Presidency discussion paper

The Finnish Presidency of the Council of EU presented a [discussion paper on Culture and sustainable development](#) at the joint Cultural Affairs Committee/Audiovisual Working Party meeting which took place on 4 July. The Finnish Presidency believes that the institutional change in the EU will open a window of opportunity to further mainstream culture and cultural policy into sustainable development, bearing in mind that this is also a contractual obligation agreed in the UNESCO Convention on the Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions. The objective of the Presidency is to facilitate SD by integrating culture into sustainable development strategies and thereby complement the EU’s sustainable development tool-kit with cultural policy tools. For this purpose, the Presidency will prepare a Council document (conclusions/resolution) with a view to its adoption by the EYCS Council in November. [The Presidency culture conference on 9 – 10 July](#) also focused on two preconditions for sustainability, namely the links between culture and democracy, on the one hand, and culture and education, on the other.

2019 European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards

The winners of the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards 2019, Europe’s most prestigious honour in the field, funded by the Creative Europe programme, were announced on 21 May by the European Commission and Europa Nostra. The 25 laureates from 16 countries have been recognised for their impressive accomplishments in conservation, research, dedicated service, and education, training and awareness-raising. The winners will be honoured at the high-profile European Heritage Awards Ceremony on 29 October in Paris, during the European Heritage Congress.

Europa Nostra Awards will also be given to two remarkable heritage achievements from European countries not taking part in the EU Creative Europe programme, namely Switzerland and Turkey. Connecting regional research infrastructure is the key to a digital and innovative Europe

Narrowing the innovation and digital divides in Europe was in the spotlight on 11 July, when the European Committee of the Regions’ Commission for Social Policy, Employment, Culture, Education and

Research (SEDEC) met in Brussels. Members adopted an opinion drafted by Eamon Dooley (IE/Renew Europe), a member of Offaly County Council, on the future of research infrastructure and the European Research Area. Mr Dooley's opinion highlights that research infrastructures have a deeply territorial character.

They are critical for regional development, extending from scientific output to the impact on educational ecosystems, and also for combating global challenges linked to climate and the environment. Another concern is that the share of research funding by the government sector in the EU has stagnated at a little over 2%. There is also an imbalance at regional level: just 31 out of 281 NUTS 2 regions reported R&D investments above the EU target of 3.0% in 2015, with clear research-intensive clusters throughout certain regions in the EU and other regions that are lagging behind, as the recent *Regional Innovation Scoreboard 2019* shows. Among other recommendations in this Statement, Europa Nostra stresses the need for Horizon Europe to build upon the policy momentum initiated by the European Year of Cultural Heritage 2018 and to contribute to the implementation of the first-ever [European Framework for Action on Cultural Heritage](#) and the [Berlin Call to Action "Cultural Heritage for the Future of Europe"](#). ESPON2020 - The Material Cultural Heritage as a Strategic Territorial Development

Resource: Mapping Impacts Through a Set of Common European Socio-economic Indicators

This research activity attempts to quantify the contribution (impact) of material cultural heritage to economic development in the stakeholder countries and regions over the past 5 years. Building on the work done by the European Heritage Heads Forum's Economic Task Force and the European Commission, this research activity will define a list of economic sectors on which the material cultural heritage has an impact and perform data collection on the selected impact indicators.

This study is named as one of the key studies by the "European Framework for Action on Cultural Heritage" (adopted by the European Commission in December 2018). Economic statistics and indicators produced will be useful for understanding the economic contribution of the material cultural heritage. Culture, Heritage and Tourism as Factors for Sustainable Development of Small and Medium-Size Cities (SMCs): the European Perspectives"

The ENCATC Labelled Event, the International conference "Culture, Heritage and Tourism as Factors for Sustainable Development of Small and Medium-Size Cities (SMCs): the European Perspectives" took place in the Bulgarian town of Blagoevgrad the last three days of May 2019. The event was coordinated by prof. assoc. [Svetlana Hristova](#) from the South-West University "Neofit Rilsky", co-organised by the Bulgarian Sociological Association and the Blagoevgrad Municipality, with the financial support of the Fund for Scientific Research at the Ministry of Education and Science. The conference turned into an interdisciplinary and intergenerational forum to review and critically discuss the potentials, challenges and limits of culture, heritage and tourism to contribute to the sustainable development of European small and medium size cities (SMCs) which confront nowadays graver problems than ever before, therefore the need to plan strategically and mobilize assets has never been greater. A decision was

taken at the end of the conference to establish an international research network focused on culture of sustainable development of SMCs. More information [here](#).

EU Heritage launches a survey for the identification of skills and training needs for cultural heritage professionals

Partners in the EU Heritage consortium, a transnational developed under Erasmus + EU programme (Sector Skills Alliance for Design and Delivery of VET), are currently undertaking an extensive research to learn about the skills and training needs for cultural heritage professionals across EU-28 countries. As a first stage in this research phase of the project, over 370 training programmes and projects on cultural heritage were mapped, and more than 1,100 relevant and key stakeholders were identified as a result of a joint desk research work carried out by all partners in all EU-28 countries. After that, a survey was designed and launched, which is open at the moment, targeting managers and cultural heritage and cultural tourism workforce. This research phase of the project will result in a report, and later phases involve the development of a set of training modules, an online learning platform, pilot training sessions and an evaluation framework. Help Erasmus+ to understand how the landscape of youth representation in Europe is changing

Are you a youth NGO or network operating in Europe? Would you help Erasmus+ to understand how the European landscape of youth representation is changing?

Launched on 12 July, an ambitious new survey aims to explore the role of NGOs and networks in supporting youth participation in democratic life in the EU. Carried out by Ecorys, the survey will help gather new evidence on how young people engage in decision making at European, national and local levels, and to better understand the value and contribution of EU funding. It will also examine the new trends in participation, including the role of online youth movements.

The survey is part of a wider European Commission initiative to inform the rollout of the European Youth Strategy 2019-2027, and in particular the objective of 'Engaging' with young people.

It follows the latest Eurobarometer results in April 2019, which showed that while younger generations continue to take an active interest in political and social issues, the ways in which they participate are becoming ever more diverse.

The call for the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards have been published. The Awards, co-funded by the Creative Europe Programme, honour up to 30 outstanding heritage achievements from all parts of Europe every year. The number of awards each year will depend on the type and quality of entries received. Among the winners, four projects (one per category) will be selected as Grand Prix winners and one will receive the Public Choice Award following an online vote.

Outstanding heritage achievements will be awarded in the following categories:

- Conservation
- Dedicated service by individuals or organisations
- Research
- Education, training and awareness-raising

In addition, two new ILUCIDARE Special Prizes will be awarded in 2020 and 2021 from among the submitted applications. ILUCIDARE is a project funded by the European Union's Horizon 2020 Research and Innovation Programme with the aim of fostering heritage-led innovation and diplomacy.

The prize is awarded annually for the best paper presented at the EAA conference by a student or archaeologist, working on a dissertation. All BA, MA and Ph.D. students, as well as archaeologists working on a dissertation, who present a paper at the conference are eligible to apply and are encouraged to submit their papers to the Award Selection Committee. All co-authors (up to a maximum of 3 co-authors) must prove their student status; papers co-authored by a thesis supervisor are not eligible.
