




The Israeli Law of Antiquities - 1978




- 29.(a) A person shall not carry out, or allow to be carried out, any of the following on an antiquity site, save with the written approval of the Director and in accordance with the conditions thereof:
- (1) building, paving, the erection of installations, quarrying, mining, drilling, flooding, the clearing away of stones, ploughing, planting, or interment, the dumping of earth, manure, waste or refuse, including the dumping thereof on adjoining property, any alteration, repair or addition to an antiquity located on the site, the dismantling of an antiquity, the removal of part thereof or the shifting thereof; writing, carving or painting; the erection of buildings or walls on adjoining property;
- (2) any other operation designated by the Director in respect of a particular site.








Pre-Independence Excavations Following Development in Jerusalem








Annual Licences Issued for Excavation in Israel










Guidance for Archaeological Policy and the Preservation of the Built Cultural Heritage in Master Plans



District Master Plan for Jerusalem District Jerusalem City Master Plan 2000 Jerusalem Old City Master Plan



- 900 sites defined within the Old City (1 km²).
- Sites categorised by type, date, period, current use, registration criteria.
- Provision of basic living standards for 38,000 residents of the Old City.
- Planning through the understanding that there are elements of heritage that must remain unchanged.
- Providing planning solutions for the major religious centres and access to them Temple Mount / Haram el-Sharif, Western Wall, Holy Sepulchre.
